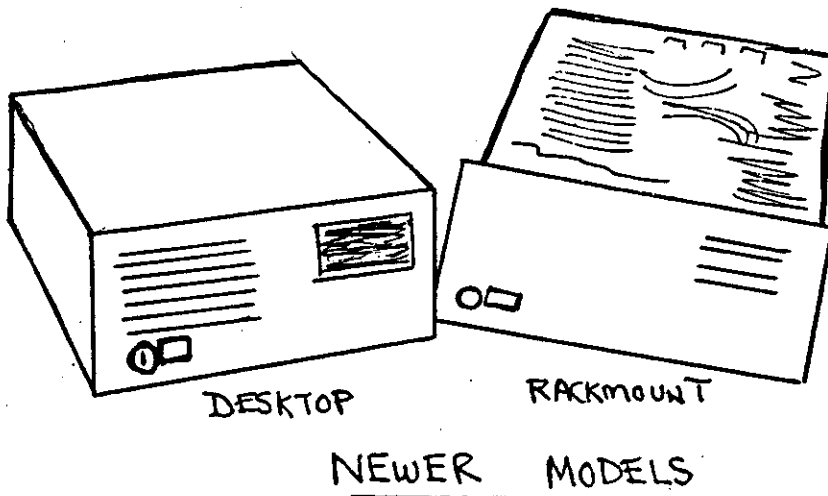

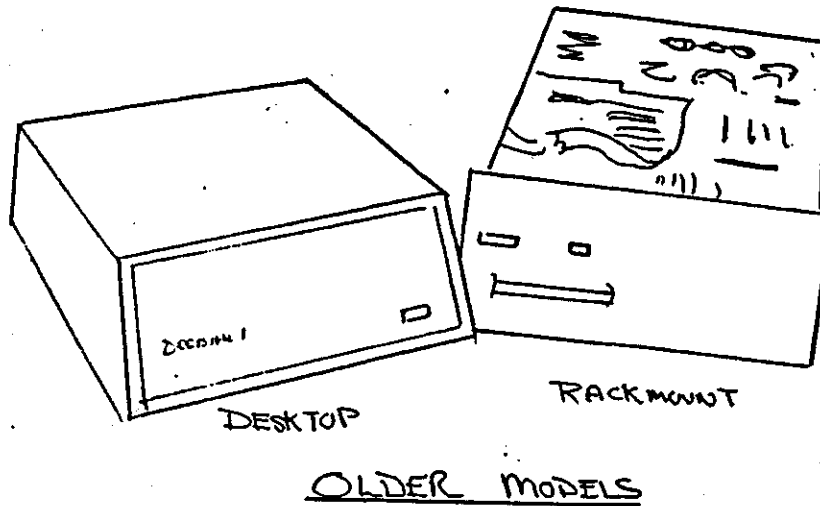

SYSTEM OVERVIEW

The Morrow Decision 1 System is a Z80 based computer that uses an S100 bus motherboard to provide multiboard capabilities. The system is available in both single user and multi-user configurations. Multi-user systems utilize one terminal for system management and that terminal is designated as the console. In addition to the console a system may have a combination of other terminals, built-in floppy and hard disk drives, external disk drives and printers.

CONFIGURATION OVERVIEW

The 100 Series Decision 1 computers are single user systems and include the D100 and D120. The 200 Series are multi-user systems and include the D200, D210 and D220. The differences among models include the available operating systems, the RAM capacity, the disk drive configurations and the number of input/output ports. All systems include the following:

- CPM 2.2 Operating System
- 14 Slot Motherboard (IEEE 696/S-100 Bus structure)
- MP Z80 CPU Board
- 2K Byte Bootstrap Prom
- Realtime CMOS Clock/Calendar and Programmable Interrupt Controller
- 2 RS232C Serial Ports
- 1 Parallel Daisy Printer Port

The differences among systems are as follows:

D100

- 64K Bytes of High Speed RAM

D120

- 64K Bytes* of high speed RAM
- 5-1/4" Double Sided 48 TPI floppy drive (400K Bytes Formatted) with DMA Controller

- 10M Byte 5-1/4" Hard Disk with DMA Controller

D200

PRELIMINARY

- Micronix Operating System
- 256K Bytes of High Speed RAM
- Memory Protect Hardware
- 5-1/4" Floppy Disk (400K Formatted) with DMA Controller
- 5-1/4" Hard Disk (10M Bytes) with DMA Controller

D210

- Includes all D210 features except that it has a 16M Byte Hard Disk.

**NOTE: The Micronix Operating System and 256K Bytes may be included in the model 120 if Kit D510 has been installed.*

D220

Includes all features of D210, plus:

- Additional 256K RAM Board for a total of 512K RAM
- Multi I/O Board with three additional RS232C Serial Ports and one additional Parallel Printer Port

NOTE : Earlier Decision 1 computers were not designated by model number and may contain any combination of the aforementioned features.

As you can see, the Decision 1 Computers are basically the same but vary in features depending on the PCB's used and the disk drives available. Besides configuration differences you can expect to see a variety of physical differences depending on the vintage of the system being serviced.

Some systems will have the on/off switches mounted on the front; some on the rear. Some will be key operated, others will not. Some will have disk drives on the left side, others will have the drives on the right side. Some cabinets will be plastic, others will be metal. Some systems will be desktop, others will be rack mounted.

This module has described the configuration of the various Decision 1 Computer systems that are available. If you feel confident that you understand the information presented in this module, take the following self test.

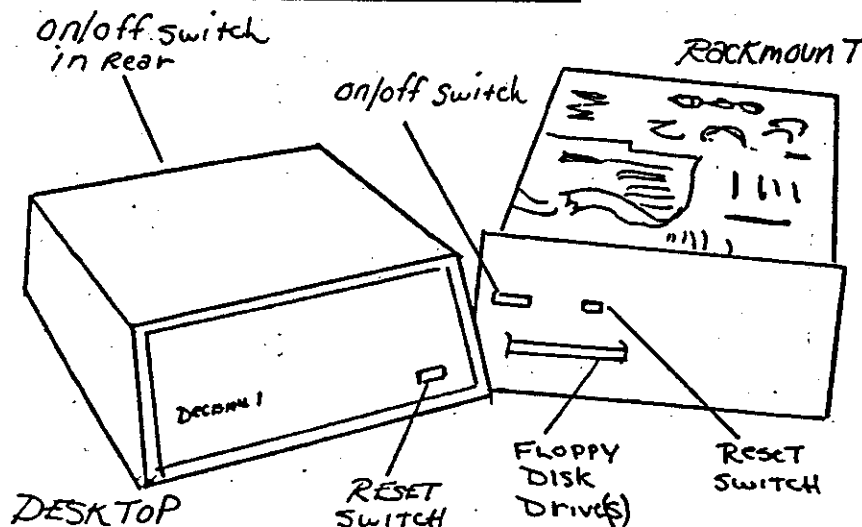
SYSTEM OPERATION

Operation of the Decision 1 is similar to the operation of most microcomputers. The only operator controls on the Decision 1 mainframe are the on/off and reset switches. On some models the on/off and reset are key operated and are on the front panel. When the unit is turned on, a panel next to the switch will light. On other models the on/off switch may be either front or rear mounted and a front mounted reset switch will light to indicate when the unit is on.

The reset switch is used to "boot" the system, that is, to load or reload the operating system into the CPU. When using the diagnostic procedures in the service manual you will be asked to reset the system several times.

CAUTION: You will be using the CPM operating system when troubleshooting the Decision 1 computer and therefore will have

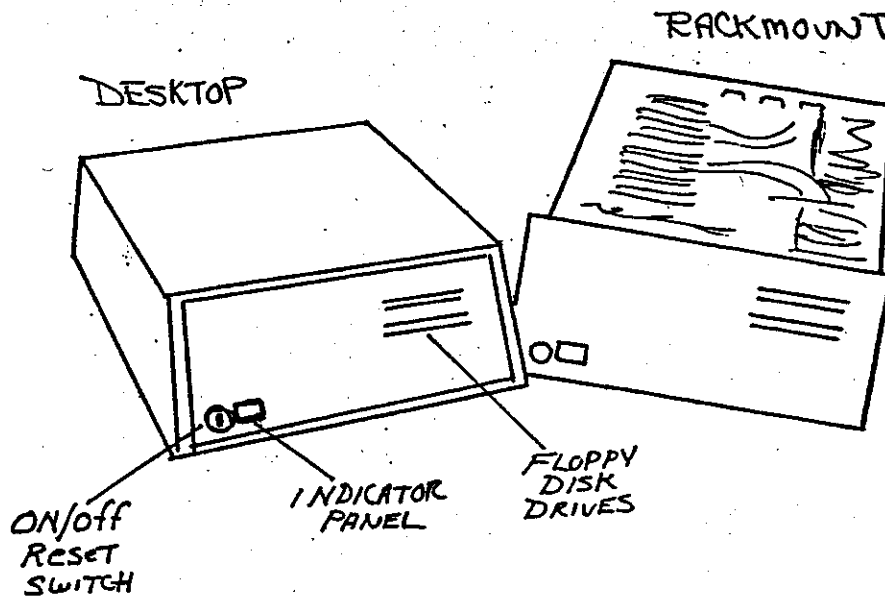

no need to use the Micronix operating system. However, in case you ever do use Micronix, never abort a program by using reset or turning off the power. Damage could occur to the file system.

One or two floppy disk drives may be included in the mainframe cabinet and each will have an LED indicator that lights when the disks are driving. You may find any of several types of disk drive doors but the operation of each will be obvious. When inserting a diskette make sure the write protect notch is to the left. Never close a door without a disk in place.

A Decision 1 cabinet may contain a 5, 10 or 16 megabyte hard disk drive. If so, the LED indicator for the drive will be near the bottom of the front panel.

SOFTWARE

CPM

All Decision 1 systems can operate on CPM 2.2 which is the system you will use to verify that the computer will boot and to run the diagnostic program when troubleshooting. It is important to note that a hard sectored disk must be used to boot the system. Specific instruction on how to boot the system and how to run the diagnostic disk will be found in the troubleshooting section of the service manual.

If a system is set to boot from a 5 1/4" floppy disk drive, and the system also has an 8" floppy disk drive, it will try to boot from the 8" drives first, even if the diskette is in the 5 1/4" drive. Open the doors to the 8" drives and the system will select the 5 1/4" drive.

MICRONIX

As an additional operating system some Decision 1 computers will use Micronix which is an operating system designed by Morrow and is similar to the Bell Laboratories Unix. Micronix is a complex operating system and takes considerable file space. If a system has Micronix, the Micronix will be loaded on a hard disk and the system may boot from the hard disk. Micronix has the following features:

- Multi user capability Up to 15 individual users
- Multi Tasking Each user can run several programs at once
- Heirarchical file management Files are organized logically as in an outline
- File protection Data can be protected or shared. For example, some reports can be open to some users and closed to others
- CPM compatibility Micronix includes a CPM emulator that runs CPM applications programs unchanged. Micronix can read and write CPM floppy diskettes and read IBM PC/DOS diskettes.
- Unix compatibility Micronix is compatible with Bell Lab's version 6 Unix at the system call and library level. Source code written to run under Unix will compile and run under Micronix.

HARD DISK BOOTING

If a system has a hard disk drive it is likely that the customer will have the system configured to boot from the hard disk so that they will not have to load a floppy disk to use the system. You must, however, reconfigure the system to boot from a floppy

disk because the diagnostic program you will be using is on a floppy disk. That procedure is included in the troubleshooting FIP in the service manual.

Caution: Whenever you are working on a system that has a hard disk drive, remember that the hard disk contains files and they will be lost if the hard disk is formatted. The files can also be lost when performing certain tests that are on the diagnostic program. There are appropriate warnings in the service manual whenever there is a danger of losing information from a hard disk.

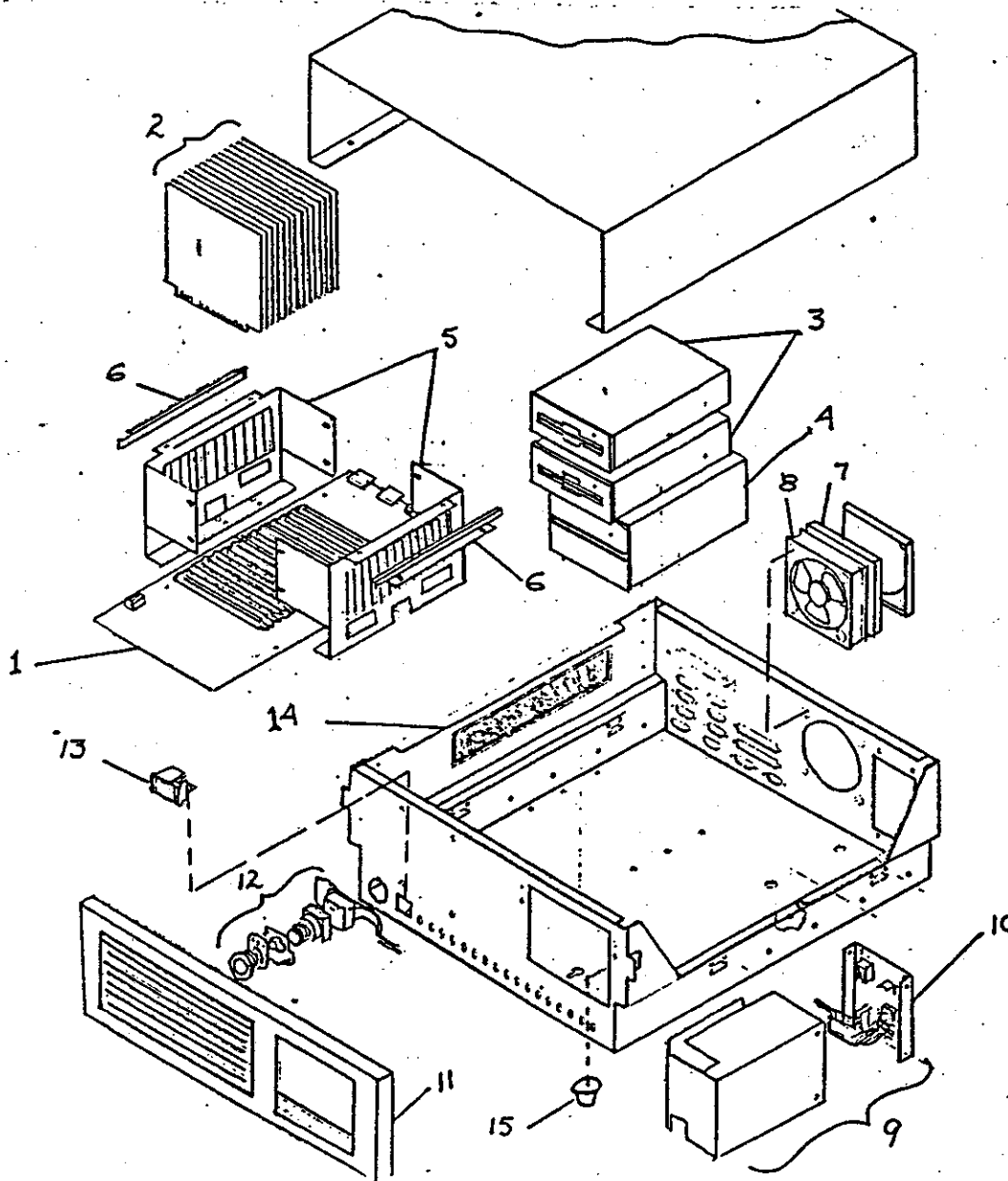

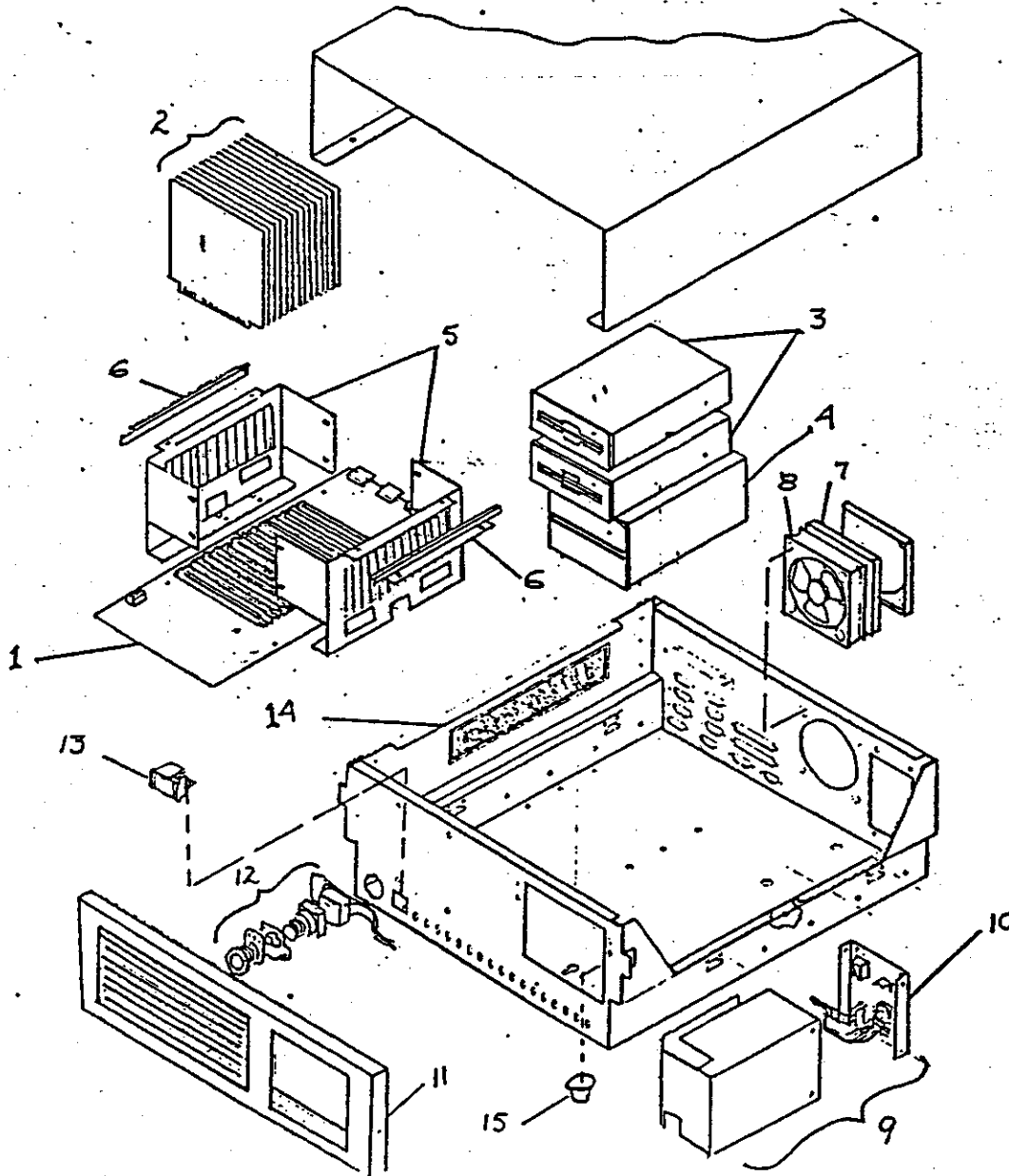

COMPONENT LOCATION

The component location section of the service manual identifies the various boards that may be found in the Decision 1 system and identifies any components on the boards that you must be aware of to maintain the system.

REPAIRS

The Repairs section of the service manual provides any special instructions that are necessary to know when replacing components.

PARTS LISTS

This section of the service manual provides instructions that you will need to know when replacing components.

TROUBLESHOOTING

The major portion of the troubleshooting section of the service manual consists of a lengthy Fault Isolation Procedure (FIP). The FIP will identify any of the following components that are defective:

- ON/OFF Reset Switch
- Power Indicator
- Cooling Fan
- Power Supply
- All PCB's
- All Floppy or Hard disk drives
- Cables & Harnesses

PRELIMINARY

The FIP consists of the following checks and Tests:

- A. Check for Primary Power
- B. Check for System Boot
- C. Memory PCB check
- D. DJ/DMA PCB Test
- E. QRUN Test
- F. Check Test (Hard Disk Drive Test)
- G. FORMATMW TEST
- H. Floppy Disk Drive Test
- J. Floppy Drive Alignment Check
- K. CRT Terminal Test
- L. Printer Test

A. CHECK FOR PRIMARY POWER

This check assures that power is getting to the power supply.

B. CHECK FOR SYSTEM BOOT

This check assures that the system is able to load and execute programs. This is necessary because the remainder of the FIP uses a floppy disk loaded series of programs called Diagnostics II to test the major assemblies of the system.

In some cases the customer's system will be configured to "boot" from a disk drive other than drive "A" This requires that some switch settings on the CPU board be reset. The Check for System Boot procedure will tell you what to do. The procedure also leads you to various checks that will indicate whether any of the major assemblies are causing a booting problem.

REMAINDER OF CHECKS AND TESTS

The remainder of the Checks and Tests use the Diagnostic II test disk to test the major assemblies of the system. The disk is a series of programs developed by Supersoft Inc. to interface with the hardware through CPM, thereby testing the major components of a system. The FIP was designed to use specific portions of the Diagnostic II programs to their best advantage for servicing the Decision I system.

The Checks and Tests consist of inputting certain information on the terminal and verifying that the appropriate response is displayed on the screen. Basically the procedures consist of having you check cable connections, reseating the boards, checking switch positions and replacing assemblies as necessary.

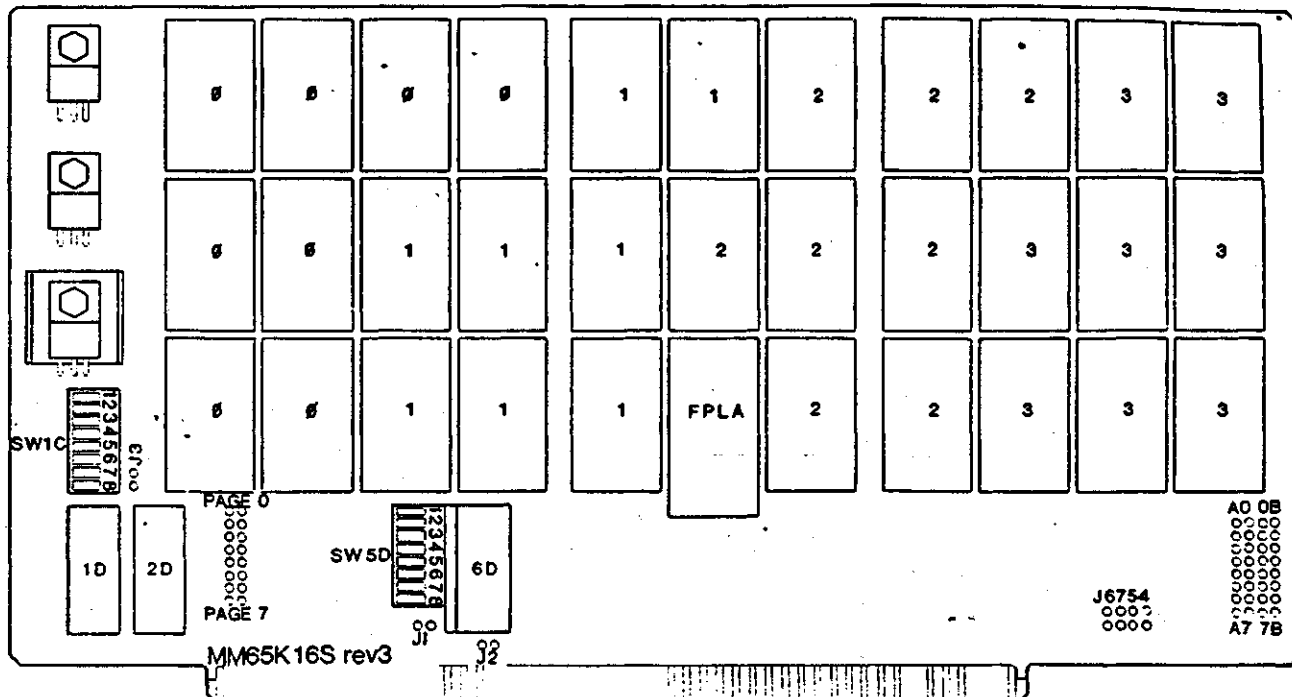

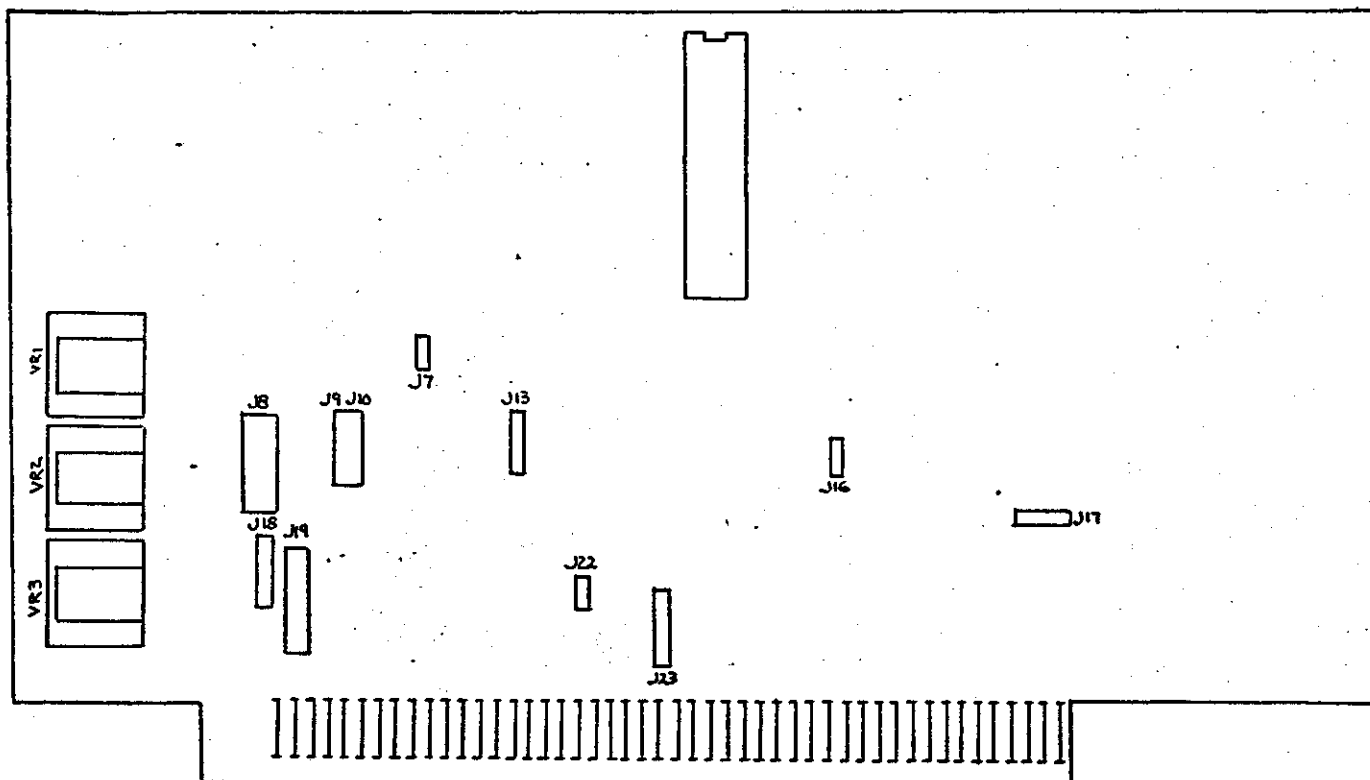

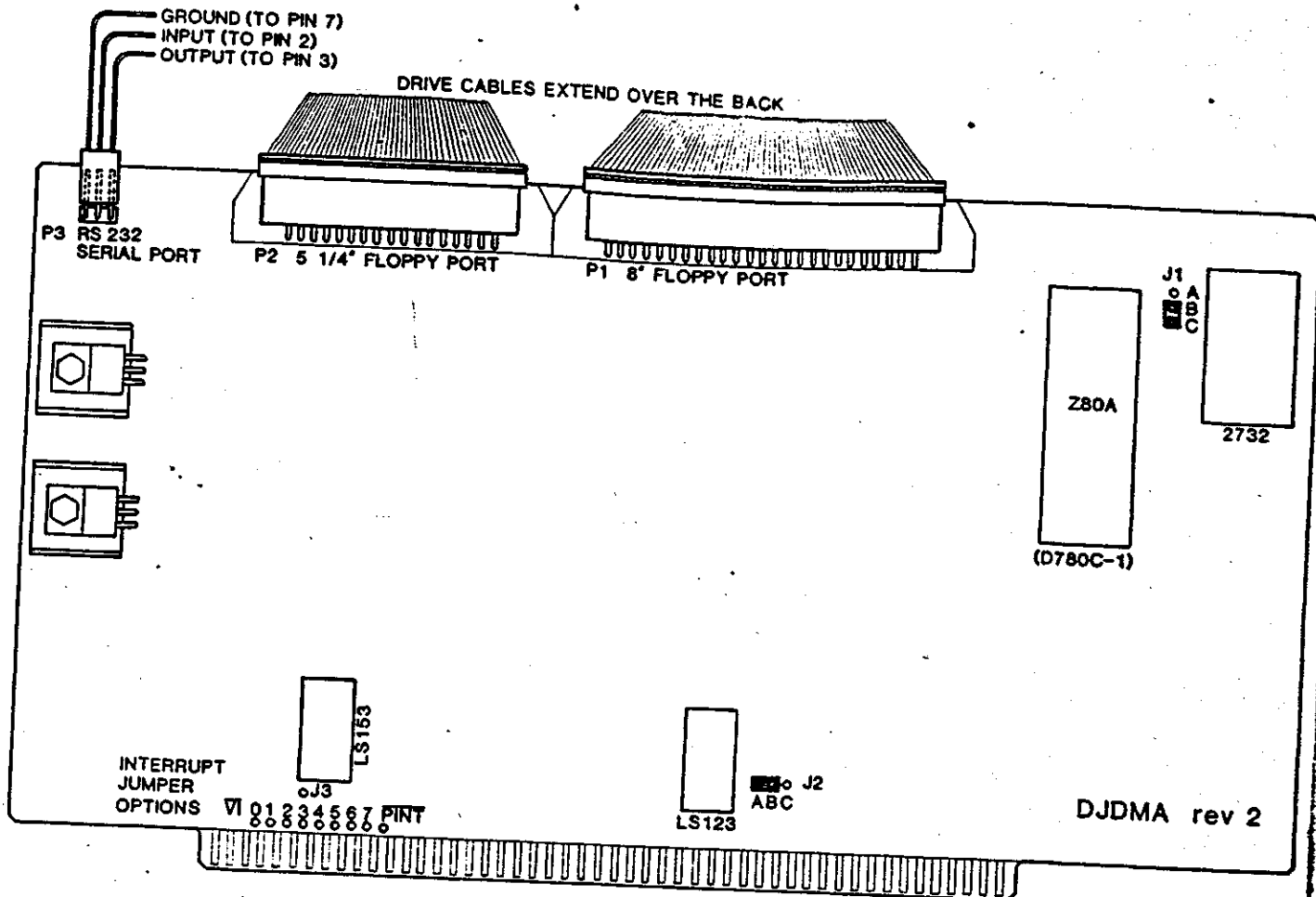


MEMORY PCB (MM65KS)

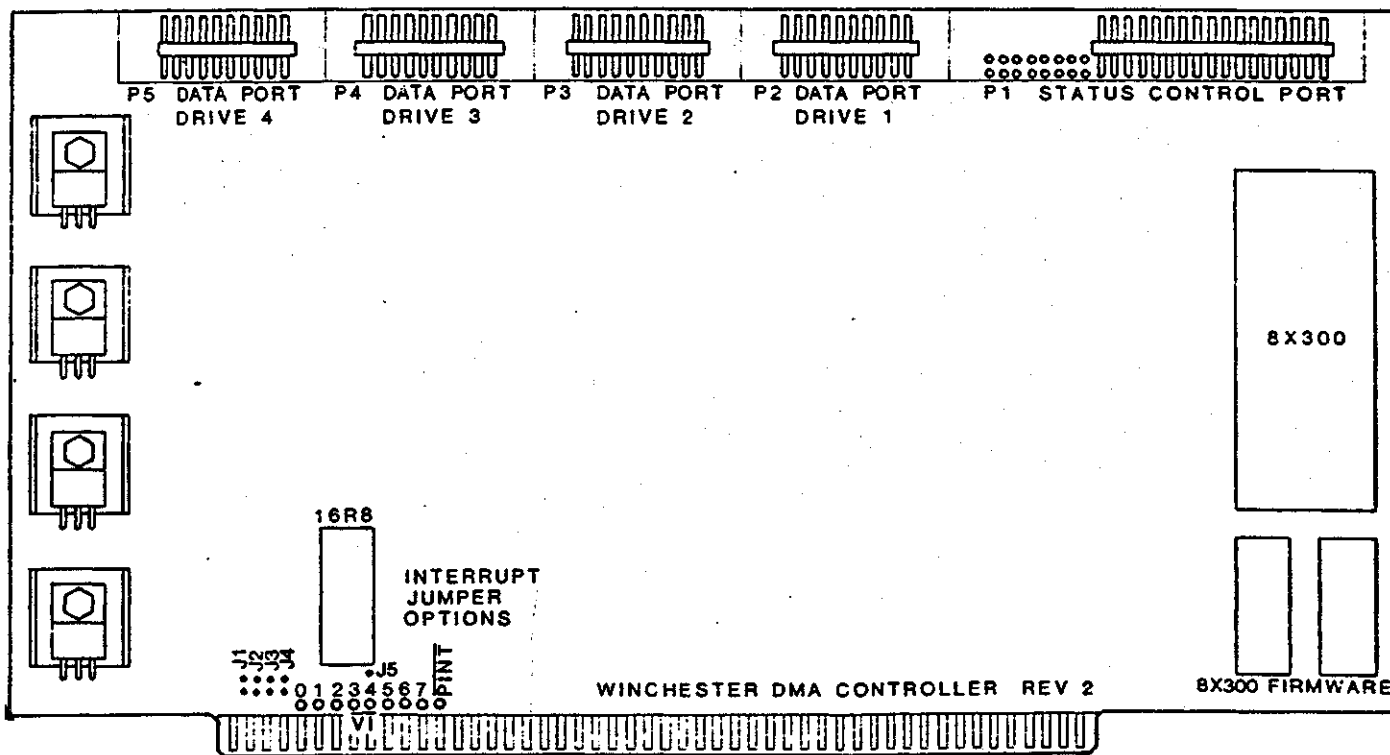


MEMORY PCB (MM256KD)

COMPONENT LOCATION



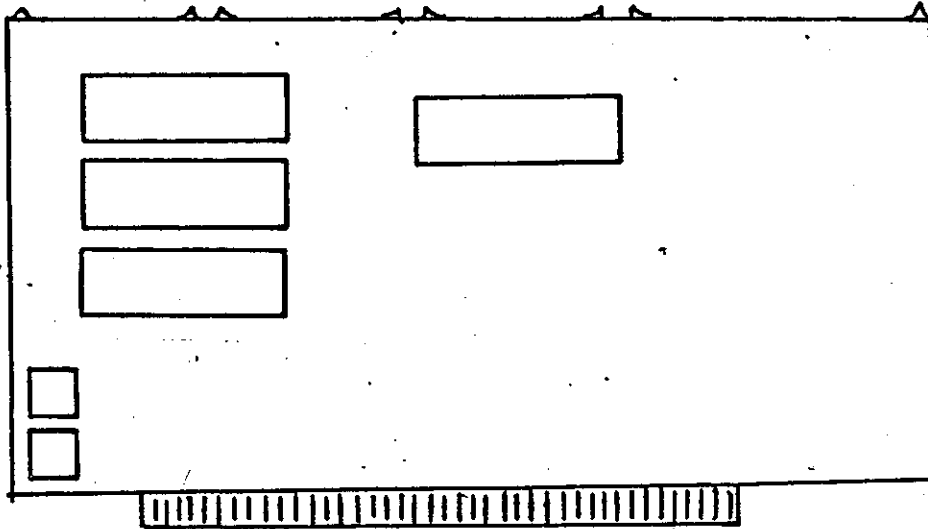
DJ/DMA FLOPPY DISK CONTROL PCB

PRINTED CIRCUIT BOARDS

Removal

To remove any PCB except the wunderbuss, remove the two card cage brackets, remove ribbon cable as necessary and pull the board straight up.

Replacement

When installing a new board be sure to position any switches and jumpers to the same positions as on the replaced board.

Any board may be installed into any socket on the wunderbuss. When possible do not place boards next to each other in order to leave room for air circulation.

WUNDERBUSS

Removal

1. Remove card cage brackets.
2. Remove PCB's.
3. Remove six screws that hold the card cage to the chassis.
4. Remove 8 screws that hold the wunderbuss to the card cage.
5. Disconnect the reset cable from the rear of the wunderbuss.
6. Disconnect the ribbon cable from the rear of the wunderbuss.
7. Disconnect one end of the DC power cable from the front of the wunderbuss and the other end from the power supply.
8. Carefully lift the wunderbuss and card cage from the chassis.

Replacement

There are two different wunderbuss configurations. They are electrically the same but mechanically different. A matrix is being developed to enable you to order the proper wunderbuss.

REPAIRS

PRELIMINARY

POWER SUPPLY

Removal

1. Disconnect power cord and all cables.
2. Remove screw that holds power supply to bottom of chassis.
3. Remove four screws that hold power supply to rear of chassis.
4. Lift power supply out of chassis.

Replacement

There are five power supply configurations. They are all electrically interchangeable but are mechanically different. A matrix is being developed to enable you to order the proper supply.

DISK DRIVE ASSEMBLY

Removal

1. Disconnect harnesses.
2. Loosen four screws on the underside of the chassis.
3. Slide the disk drive assembly back and lift it out of the chassis.

NOTE: If the system has two floppy disk drives mark the position of each.

PRELIMINARY

TROUBLESHOOTING

This Section of the service manual will assist you in repairing problems within the Morrow Decision 1. The procedures are "directive". Directive means you will be given a series of statement, checks and or observations to be made. Then depending upon your response you will be given directions to help you in each phase of troubleshooting.

PLEASE NOTE:

The troubleshooting procedures contain recommended replacement parts for the correction of problems. If the recommended part replacement does not correct the problem, reinstall the old part and continue troubleshooting.

Tools Required

You will need a Diagnostic II diskette, a blank formatted hard sectored diskette, digital volt meter and a Phillips screwdriver.

The following is a list of cautions and troubleshooting hints to be observed when testing the Decision 1 system.

THINGS TO REMEMBER:

Before doing any testing or troubleshooting of the Decision 1 system be sure that all information stored on the Hard disk has been saved on backup diskettes.

Always remove the floppy diskette and when possible run the "DOWN" program before turning power off.

Only press reset when the red activity LED on the floppy disk drive is off.

When opening the floppy disk drive door and or removing the diskette insure the activity LED is off.

CAUTIONS:

The Hard Disk Drive is a delicate instrument. Before moving or turning the Decision 1 on its side be sure to run the "DOWN" program to park the heads of the hard disk in a safe zone. This will prevent the heads from damaging the disk surfaces.

When replacing a PCB in the WB I/O, be sure the component side of the PCB is facing the front of the unit.

The ribbon cables in the Decision 1 are not keyed. When replacing or reconnecting the cables insure that they are oriented exactly as they were removed.

On some of the CPU PCBs the Monitor switch in location 16D may have been installed in the wrong direction such that the label for switch 1 is closest to the bottom of the PCB. Switch 1 is actually the top position on the bank of switches.

PRELIMINARY

TROUBLESHOOTING

Before starting to troubleshoot the Decision 1, insure that the unit is plugged into an adequate power source with no other major electrical appliances such as air conditioners, space heaters, etc.. Such appliances can cause voltage variations which may cause erratic performance or intermittent problems with the computer.

A. CHECK FOR PRIMARY POWER

1. With power off visually inspect the Decision 1 system for obvious problems (disconnected or loose cables, broken components, etc.).
2. Now apply power by either reversing the position of the rocker switch or by turning the keyswitch to the on position.
3. Check that the power indicator and the Decision 1 cooling fan are on. If so proceed to step B, "Check For System Boot".
4. If neither the power indicator nor the fan came on, turn power off and check the following:
 - The circuit breaker on the back of the Decision 1 (key-switch models only).
 - The wall outlet and power cord for the correct voltage.
 - The connection of the power cord to the Decision 1. The socket is deep and must be fully inserted for a good connection.
 - The power switch itself for proper operation. (NOTE: On keyswitch modles the power on side of the switch is the side with the black and red wire pair.)
5. If the cooling fan is operating but the power indicator is out, the system may be operational with the exception of the lamp. Check the lamp and the connections to it.

B. Check For System Boot

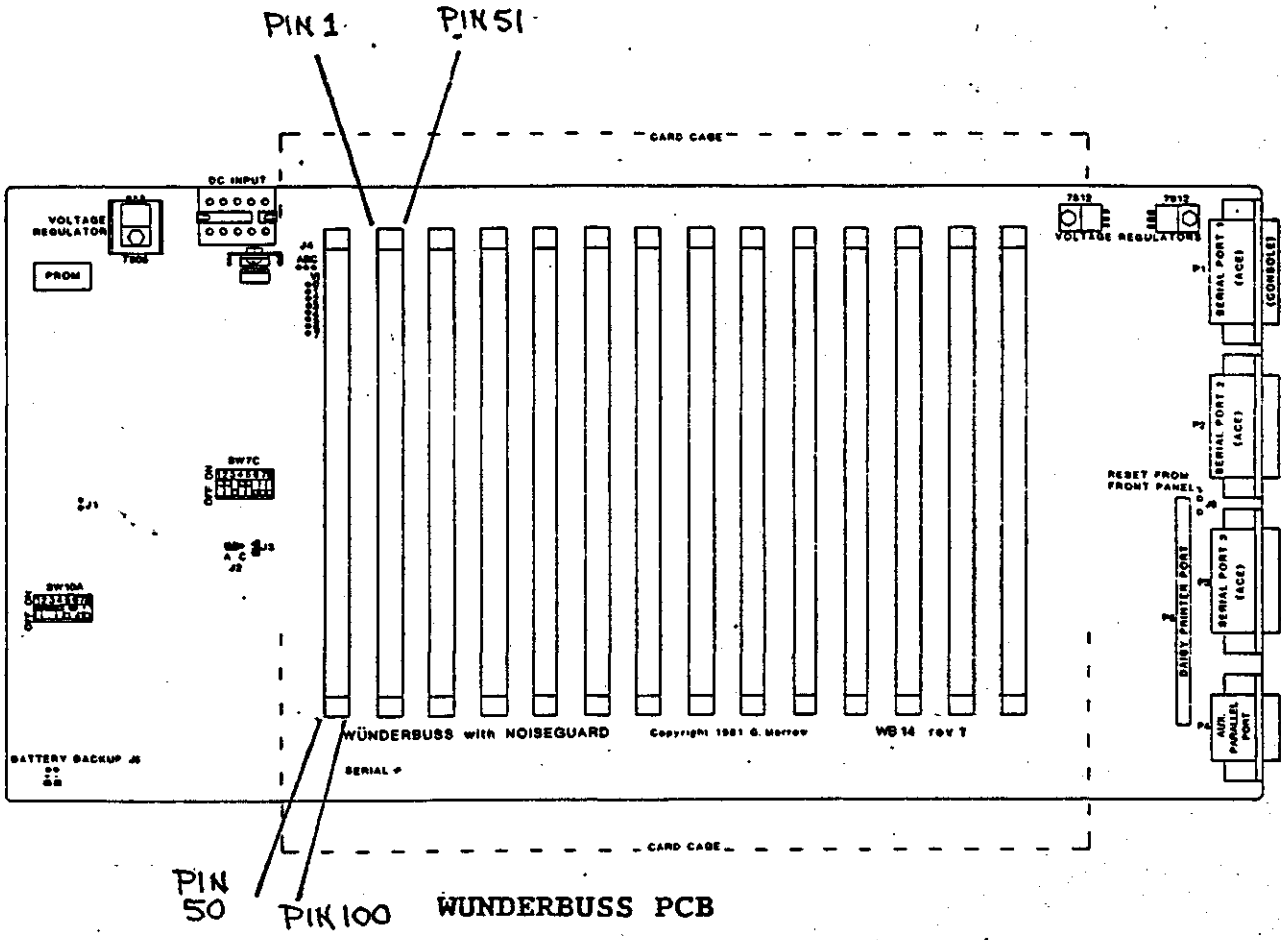
1. Check the level of software installed in the Decision 1. Insure that you have the proper level CP/M and Diagnostic floppy diskette for the system.
2. Check to see if the system is configured to boot from the floppy disk drive. If not proceed as follows:
 - a. Press power off and remove the CPU PCB.
 - b. Record the settings of Monitor switch (lower right hand corner of the CPU PCB).

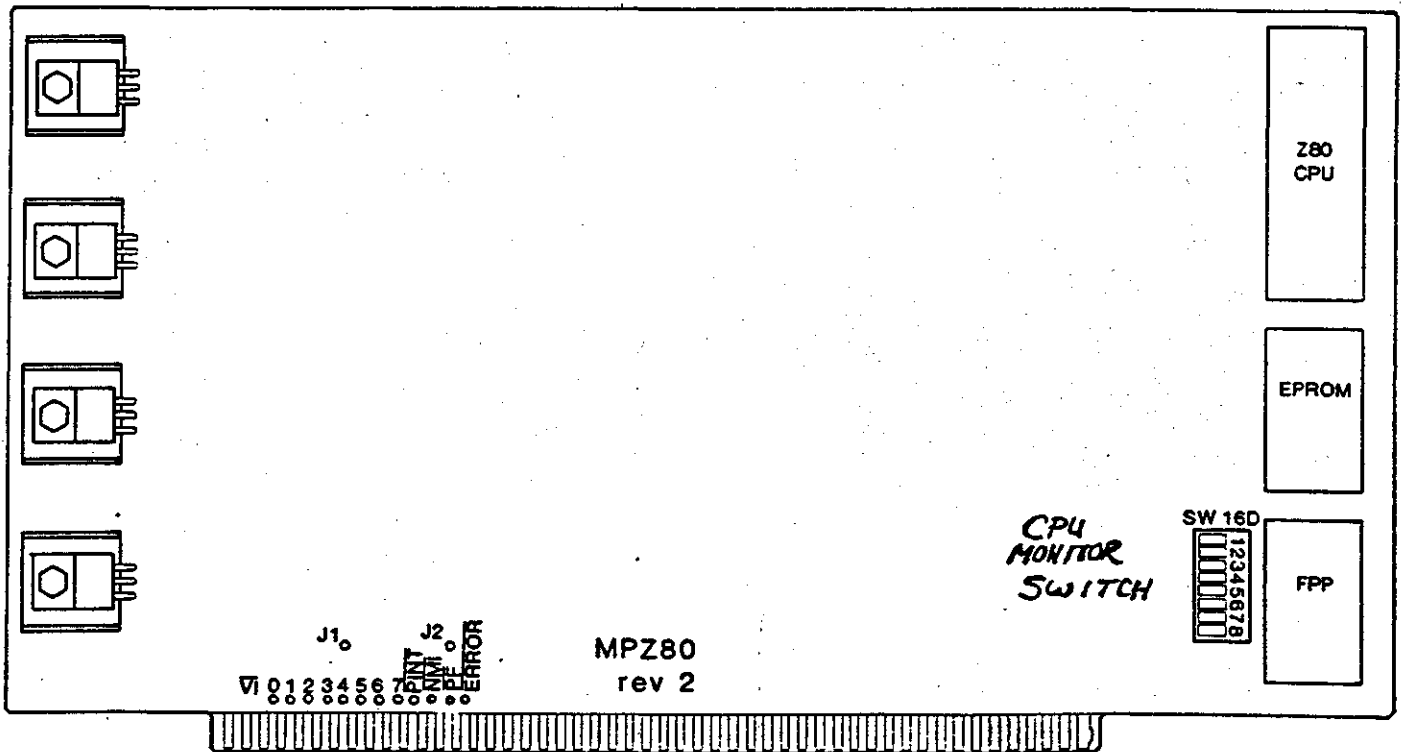

CPU PCB

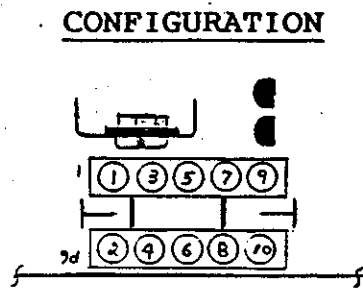

- c. Set positions 4 and 6 OFF and all other positions ON.
 - d. Install the CPU PCB, check all connections, and press power on.
3. Insert the Decision 1, Diagnostic Diskette into the floppy disk drive and press "RESET".
 4. After a pause the screen should display a sign-on message followed by an "A>" prompt.

example: s 64K CP/M 2.2 E--
 AB: DJDMA 5 1/4", CD: DJDMA 8", E: HDDMA
 A>
 5. If "A>" is present proceed to STEP E, the QRUN TEST.
 6. If not, check that a properly operating CRT is connected to port 1.
 7. If so, remove the diskette, turn power off and proceed as follows:
 - a. Check the two wires from the system reset switch to J6 on the WB I/O PCB. (NOTE: On keyswitch modules the reset wires are the black and blue wire pair on the same side of the switch.)
 - b. Turn power on. Insert the appropriate diagnostic diskette and press reset. If system now "boots" proceed to STEP E, the QRUN TEST.
 - c. If the system still does not "boot" proceed to step 8.
 8. Remove and reinstall the CPU PCB in a different connector on the WB I/O PCB.
 9. Check to see that all boards and cables are seated properly.
 10. Turn power on. Insert the appropriate diagnostic diskette and press reset. If system now "boots" proceed to STEP E, the QRUN TEST.

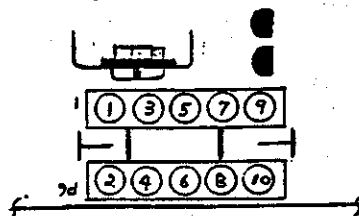

TROUBLESHOOTING

BASE PORT ADDRESS SWITCH 7C

This switch on WB I/O board location 7C is used by Morrow Design's software to set the BASE port address, wait states and polarity of auxiliary parallel port handshaking inputs. The normal base address for all Morrow Designs software is 48 hex. The following summarizes this switch:

Table 1-4: Switch 7C - BASE PORT ADDRESS SWITCH SETTINGS

WUNDERBUS I/O - JUMPERS

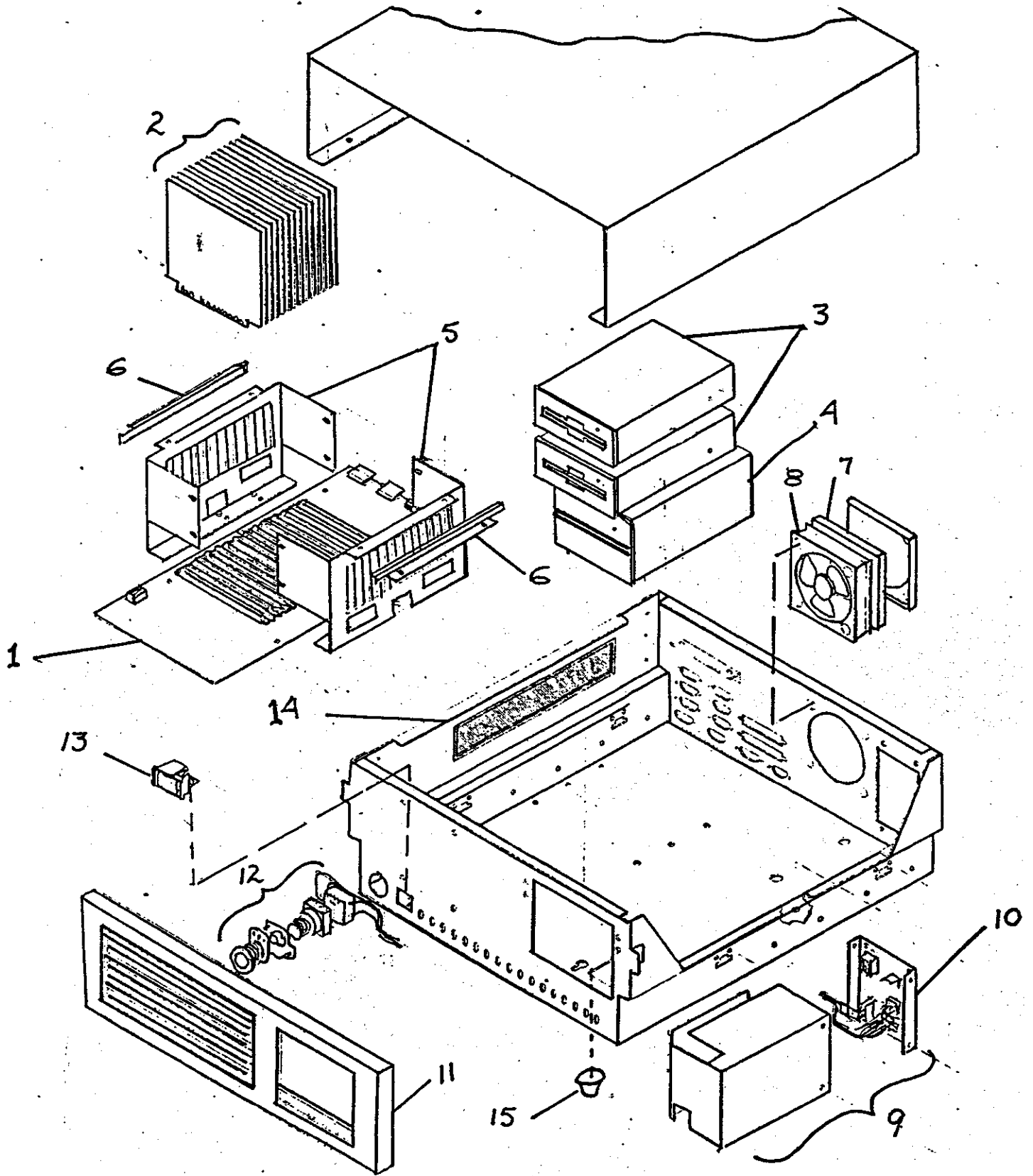
